You may remember that ACS was granted Rule 6 status at the Horn Cragg Inquiry at which a quarrying

company were appealing against Bradford's decision to deny their planning application to re-open the quarry above Silsden.

Our main interest related to the negative impact that the re-opening of the quarry would have on the ecology of Addingham Moorside. We are delighted to announce that the appeal was denied. Thanks to our Planning and Environment Groups for their input.

What are our village wildlife trends?

You may be interested to know that our Environment Group produces a range of reports which record various aspects of their work. They have now been recording for sufficient years to begin to look at trends which hopefully, with everyone's efforts, will begin to look positive. There are annual reports detailing the birds, bees and butterflies that are recorded in Addingham as well as reports that show the annual progress with the removal invasive Himalayan Balsam. The reports can be accessed via the <u>Wildlife tab</u> on the AEG website Many thanks for the reports to Chris Acomb, Malcolm Secrett, Jan Hindle and Rick Battarbee.

Keeping you in the loop.... Almost inevitably I guess, we have had to take the decision to raise our subscription amount for the next membership year. Over the last few years, all our basic costs such as printing, room hire, speakers etc have gone up. This will be the first increase since 2017!

At the same time and after much discussion we have also decided to charge individual memberships rather than applying a different rate for couples. This seems much fairer all round.

So, in September we will be raising the membership subs from £9 per person to £11 per person.

We are not planning to introduce any other charges or changes to our programme so for example our speaker meetings, newsletters, new members meetings etc will remain free of charge to members, and our Community, Planning, Heritage, and Environment Groups will continue with their work to benefit the village.

ADDINGHAM'S D-DAY HEROES Continued from last month:

George Houston

But four days before D-Day another Addingham man had also been in action. On 2 June 1944 George Houston, an air gunner in Bomber Command, was flying in a 4-engined Halifax, P for Peter, LL287 from the Special Operations Executive aerodrome at RAF Tempsford in Bedfordshire. He had joined 138 Squadron there in November 1943 and begun active operations in January 1944, mainly over France and Belgium, but occasionally to Norway and Holland. On 2 June his Halifax was due to drop weapons and munitions to the French Resistance just prior to D-Day, so they might assist the invasion with guerilla warfare against the Germans. Unfortunately the plane was shot down by a German 88mm anti-aircraft gun. Three crew members were killed and a fourth badly burned. Only the pilot and navigator had known the plane's destination. Both were killed. Thrown clear on impact, George was wounded but could walk as far as a French farmhouse, owned by Madam Robineau. He was captured there by the Germans and imprisoned in Buchenwald concentration camp and then in Stalag Luft 3 at Sagan in Poland where he spent the rest of the war. What, one is bound to wonder, was the fate of Madam Robineau ? A monument to the crash site was unveiled in 1998. George came to live in Addingham in 1976, while working for General Electric. He died eleven years after Les [Chamberlain in 2012.

Hubert Prince Wall

Les Chamberlain and George Houston were lucky enough to survive the War, despite the critical parts they played in D-Day. Another Addingham man was not so lucky. Hubert Wall lived on Daisy Hill. Though he survived D-Day, he was shot by a sniper four months later on 11 October 1944 while building a bridge in Belgium, near Zeebrugge. Hubert was 29 and left a wife, Florrie, and two daughters, Bessie, aged 9 and Pat, aged 2 by then living at 21 North Street.


