Ferry Cross the Wharfe lan Cameron and Jill Riley

At sixty-five miles, the River Wharfe is the twenty-first longest river in Britain. But how to cross it? Other places had stone bridges, but not Addingham. Instead, there were fords at High Mill and Cocken End, at the boundary with Ilkley and, until replaced by a footbridge in 1896, there was a longstanding ferry. But what do we know about the ferry? The answer is not as much as we would like.





We know from maps that the ferry was based at top of North Street. The ferryman worked from a hut probably at the site of the shed on the left of the photo (above). There would have been a walk to the right down the steep slope to a wooden jetty by the river's edge. Here, there is still a substantial stone wall. Remarkably, a couple of rows of steps that would have led to the jetty were discovered, only a few years ago, at the base of this wall.

The ferry itself was run by the Robinson and Norris families. Looking at the river from both banks, and using the 1853 Ordinance Survey map, the crossing would surely have been the most direct route possible – just to the left and to the other bank in line with the farm. Most likely this was by a hand pulled cable ferry. The ferryman would have pulled an overhead tensioned cable that was connected to the boat by a rope. A similar example is still in operation on the River Wye, crossing to the Saracens Head Inn – photos of the ferry in action are on their website. In contrast, our ferry was said to have been used by Beamsley parishioners to get to St Peter's church.



We all know how fast the River Wharfe can flow, and in 1895, a group of Bradford men were spilled from the ferryboat into the river. One man was swept down river and only survived because he was able to swim. There had been calls in 1889 for a better crossing of the river but it was only in 1896 was the footbridge built, a little upstream from the ferry at a cost of £145 plus £25 for the footpath. The era of the ferry crossing the Wharfe was over and while not immortalised in song in the same way as "Ferry Cross the Mersey", is nevertheless part of the rich history of the village.

Bracken Ghyll Golf Course

In 2020 the Environment Group (AEG) was alerted to the presence of an invasive weed which was overtaking one of the golf course ponds. The water weed covered the entire surface of the pond, allowing no light to penetrate the water, hence limiting the survival of any pond life. With permission, an AEG Saturday morning volunteer team was allowed to rake out the offending Curly Water Weed, provided a member of the Club stood guard against flying golf balls. This session has been repeated each year since 2020 and this year, although the dreaded weed is still present (and probably will always be) the pond is beginning to look rather fine.
