The West Yorkshire Local Nature Recovery Strategy



We are delighted to have been asked to join the West Yorkshire discussion about the Local Nature Recovery Strategy. This paragraph outlines its aims. "This strategy is one of 48 spatial mapping and planning tools. Together these will cover the whole of England and help to create a Nature Recovery Network of wildlife-rich places. This has been set out in the Environment Act 2021. The aim is to expand, improve and connect these places across our town, cities, countryside and coast. This will help us deal with three of the biggest challenges we face today: biodiversity loss, climate change and wellbeing."

Revision of the National Policy Framework (NPPF) 2024

Housing Crisis There is a general consensus that England is in the grip of a housing crisis. The main reasons put forward are that insufficient houses are being built resulting in new homes being unaffordable for many potential purchasers. There are also questions as to whether these new houses are fit for purpose.



New Housing Targets Acknowledging this, the new Government

has acted swiftly by increasing the annual target from the current 300,000 new homes per annum (pa) to 370,000 pa with 1,500,000 to be built by the next election. It is worth noting that the last Government struggled to build 200,000 homes pa. Housing quality is to be addressed by the wider use of "Design Codes". There will be a higher percentage of "affordable" homes and homes for social rent. More locally, the total annual number of houses to be constructed in Yorkshire and the Humber Region has been increased from 18,699 to 27,433 pa..


Consultation To facilitate these ambitious goals the Government wants to modify the current NPPF (its overarching planning policy guidance), by the end of this year. A consultation including 106 questions, has been launched on the changes it wants to make. This closes on 24th September. ACS Planning Group is working its way through this document and will make a formal response.

Bradford and Addingham It would be good to give a simple answer as to how these changes are likely to affect Addingham. However, nothing is straightforward in planning! Bradford is working on the next stage of its Local Plan, a Draft Regulation 19 document, identifying detailed sites to accommodate the requisite number of houses across the district. In Addingham the latest number we have is 175 houses over the next 15 years. It is unclear whether the uplift for Yorkshire and the Humber will have an impact on the number of houses for Addingham. Under the last Government Bradford was originally required to build 1,700 homes pa a number subsequently increased by 35% to 2,295 which is the figure currently being applied. Under the new Government's proposed calculation, the figure becomes 2089. The Government is removing the 35% uplift from the 20 largest cities (including Bradford) casting doubt on the situation!

In summary it is not clear what the impact will be for Addingham but it will probably delay publication of Bradford's Draft Reg 19 report. However, there will be huge pressure on Local Authorities to get houses built and that will be felt in Addingham!

The Government Consultation Document together with the current NPPF Policy containing the tracked changes the Government wishes to make, will be uploaded to the Planning section of the Society Website. If, in the meantime, you wish to respond to the consultation it can be found <u>here</u>.

ACS's response to the consultation will be posted later in September.



Sugar Hill: A tale of sweet and slavery Don Barrett – Heritage Group

This little lane in the centre of the village now has few buildings but quite a few stories to tell.

The photo shows how the area looked in about 1880, **before** the railway was built. The Hen Pen and Sugar Hill can be seen behind the lady with the white apron but all the buildings on the right and the cottages opposite were demolished and replaced by the high railway bridge which dominated the lane – the remains of the walled embankment can still be seen at the top of the green.

The first building on the left, is York Cottage, 1, Sugar Hill, which has a 1730 datestone, and the house to the west of this is 114 Main St, now called Baker's Cottage because behind this is what was the village bakehouse and still retains the old 'beehive' oven where the village housewives would take their dough to be baked. Later, the baker opened a shop across Main Street (now Tiempo ladies' hairdressers) and the fact that cakes and other sugary things would have been produced at the bakehouse might have been the origin of the name Sugar Hill but see below. This is the former home of Major Ashby who kept hens in the enclosed area now the Hen Pen Garden, but this may have previously been the playground for the Old School children as well as housing the school earth closets. The Major gave this to the village in 1979 for a peppercorn rent on condition that it be maintained as a public garden. To make it visible from the road, the front wall was later reduced in height and the area has since been much improved by the Garden Friends.

The next building up the hill is Croft Cottage, previously with a barn, and round the corner is Crayke Cottage. Until recently this was a small cottage (to the left) with a larger barn to the right. Arnold Pacey recognised that the lintel beam over the cart entrance had holes in it indicating that it had been re-used. This, and some beams from inside, were dated to the 15th Century showing that they came from medieval building, possibly one of those demolished for the railway. Behind Crayke Cottage is the field Crayke's Croft and on the other side of the lane is Walker Croft. But where does slavery come in? Well, following the abolition of slavery three released slaves were brought to Addingham as servants. One of those, a lady, worked in the Sugar Hill area but had been enslaved on a sugar plantation in the Caribbean so could that have been the reason for Sugar Hill? Who knows?
